Shoreham Port has operated as a statutory undertaking Trust Port since 1760, when the first Shoreham Port Harbour Act received Royal Assent. Over the past 260 years cargoes, vessel types and land uses have all changed considerably, and the Port has continually reinvented itself. Our commercial cargoes range from timber, steel, oil, grain and aggregates. Bustling marinas are home to local leisure boat users. Our fishing vessels have made us the top UK Port for scallop landings for 5 years running. A thriving commercial property portfolio has enabled over 170 small and medium sized businesses to join our Port community.

Since our inception, Shoreham Port has been operating as a Trust Port. Our purpose to this day remains to shape and maintain the Port for the benefit of all stakeholders. The surpluses we make are reinvested in the Port to benefit everyone, creating jobs and opportunities.

In 2022 our vision for the Port remains consistent, we want to play our part in leading the regional economy to a sustainable future,



leaving things better than we found them for future generations. We are proud to have been a certified EcoPort since 2013. We have over 10,000 solar panels across the Port and on a windy day Spinny and Gusty, our two onshore turbines generate enough power for the whole Port. We work in harmony with nature and continually assess our environmental impact to protect our communities for generations to come.

Did you know...

- The Roman name for nearby Portslade was Portus Ladus which means 'the way to the Port'
- King Charles II made his escape from England to Fecamp in Normandy on 12th October 1651 in the coal brig "Surprise" which was then at Shoreham Half-laden.
- It is generally believed that the Roman port of Portus Adurni was situated on the lower reaches of the River Adur and that a Roman highway was built between the Port and London.

Getting the correct permission to visit us

If you are visiting the UK from the Continent, please ensure you read the following instructions thoroughly and take the necessary actions to enter the UK legally.



International Catering Waste

The new post-Brexit rules on vessels, which now includes fishing and leisure vessels carrying International Catering Waste (ICW), have now come into force. If your vessel has visited any non-UK port and you intend to dispose of any food or food waste (or packaging or utensils with food residue), then please make Shoreham Port aware, so that necessary arrangements can be made.

All food or food waste being disposed of must be double-bagged and disposed of in the Blue Bin – marked **non-UK Food Waste Category 1 By-Product For Disposal Only** by the pontoon entrance gate.

Need to Know

Our vibrant and secure marinas are ideal for leisure vessels and yachts with easy access to open water along the South Coast and beyond. Our marinas are ideally located within the Brighton and Hove area, with excellent transport links to London, Sussex and the South East.

Lady Bee Marina is located inside our main shipping canal, providing excellent shelter during stormy weather and the security of deep water. There are approximately 160 pontoon berths at Lady Bee Marina and among the facilities available are water and electricity, shower blocks, chandlers, parking and an array of pubs and restaurants nearby.

Leisure visitor berths are available on pontoons at Lady Bee Marina, within the impounded water of the Canal for vessels up to 16.00m. Access to Lady Bee Marina is via the Prince George lock.

Commercial vessels also transit the Port, passing through the Prince Philip lock into the Canal on most tides. Information on shipping movements can be obtained from Shoreham Harbour Radio on VHF channel 14.

A metered electrical supply (230v, 10a) is provided to all visitors and fresh water is available from the standpipes along the pontoon.

Shower Block

Full toilet and shower facilities are provided 24 hours a day situated on the western side of Lady Bee Marina.

Our Local Area

Port Kitchen and the Newport Arms

Very close to Lady Bee Marina is Port Kitchen, our own hospitality venue serving coffee and fresh local food and drinks in a modern, welcoming space. Public Transport

We are on the number 700 bus route and a few minutes walk from the stops going both west and east. Travelling west will take you into Shoreham and then on to Worthing and Littlehampton. Travelling East will take you to Hove and Brighton.

We are also 5 minutes walk to Southwick train station with direct trains into Brighton as well as to London, Southhampton, Portsmouth and Littlehampton.

Places to Visit

Shoreham Port is 5 minutes walk from Southwick Square which provides food shops, cafes, a post office and chemist.
